As we approach the end of this year, over 80% of our current cohort of trainees have accepted offers of teaching positions in our local schools. 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Sutton SCITT TiKToK

This academic year has seen the launch of the Sutton SCITT Tik Tok account where we have shared anecdotes, snippets from training days and had trainees create reels themselves. After launching in December 2023, we have created nearly 100 posts and photographs which regularly receive hundreds of views with our most popular being viewed nearly 10,000 times! The account is approaching 200 followers and posts have received a combined total of over 2500 likes. Aimed at both those who are already teaching, and those who are completing, or considering completing, their teacher training, there are posts with books to read to develop pedagogical knowledge, information about our programmes and others that are just for fun about school life.
